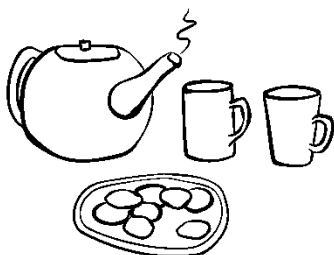
## 2. Sign up

We will review the applications and get back to you on Monday 23 December 2019.

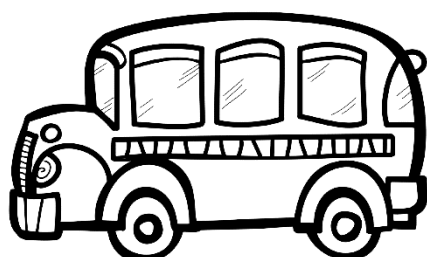
## Useful information for participants



Refreshments will be provided during the sessions. Let us know if you have any dietary requirements.

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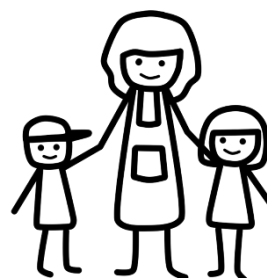
Our premises are fully accessible. Let us know if you have any additional support needs.

## About the More in Common project

People's History Museum (PHM) is the national museum of democracy, telling the story of its development in Britain: past, present, and future. The museum provides opportunities for all people to learn about, be inspired by and get involved in ideas worth fighting for; ideas such as equality, social justice, co-operation, and a fair world for all.

PHM offers a powerful programme with annual themes; the More in Common project is part of PHM's year long programme for 2020 exploring migration. Examining what the ethos of 'more in common' means to multicultural Britain today and within the context of Brexit is a major strand of PHM's focus upon migration. Inspired by the legacy of murdered MP Jo Cox (16 June 2016), the creation of a social space is at the heart of the More in Common project. This will be a dedicated area of the museum designed for special one off events and community use, along with regular gatherings that will be managed by participants in the project; people from migrant and non-migrant communities in Greater Manchester who will work together, share knowledge and exchange ideas around the notion of 'more in common'.

More in Common will culminate in an exhibition from the participants in the project that will open in summer 2020, to coincide with activities marking the fourth anniversary of Jo Cox's murder and the Great Get Together weekend.

More in Common is part of CultureLabs ([culture-labs.eu](http://culture-labs.eu)). The project has received funding from the European Union's Horizon 2020 Framework Programme for Research and Innovation under grant agreement no 770158.
