In this painting of a woman at work lots of lines and shapes make up the the science equipment she is using.


Doodle Challenge: line making in crayon

Colour in a piece of paper with colourful crayons, pressing down so there is a thick layer of wax on the paper.

Colour over the top with a black crayon.

Use something pointed like the lid of a pen to doodle, revealing the colour of the layer below.

Replicate the lines and shapes from the painting in your picture.

The bright colours of this woman's clothes and bird stand out against the brick walls of her home.

What do you think she might be looking at?

Doodle Challenge: den windows

Stick clingfilm or a piece of clear plastic to your window.

With a pen or some paints draw what you can see through it.

What stands out the most to you?

Once the ink or paint has dried, attach the clingfilm to your den using pegs or tape to make your own window.

Our local areas are unique, full of different things to do and see. In this painting we can see a cafe, a bookshop, and a greengrocers.


Doodle Challenge: map making

Get a pencil and paper.

Place something hard and round under your wrist and allow your hand to move around the paper in the direction it rolls.

Here we have a girl holding a skipping rope. She looks like she is waiting for someone to come and play.

Doodle Challenge: no looking

Place a large piece of paper on the floor.

Lie on your back just below your piece of paper.

Raise your hands over your head and doodle without looking at your piece of paper until you have finished.
